ABOUT THE CHOIR

Exultate Chamber Singers is an adult mixed-voice chamber choir located in the heart of downtown Toronto. The ensemble is enriched not only by the strong musicianship of its members but also by their varied ages, cultural backgrounds, and academic and professional credentials. Together they form a passionate, committed ensemble with a wide-ranging repertoire.

The choir is a three-time winner of the Healey Willan Grand Prize in the CBC National Radio Competition and was awarded first place in the chamber choir category of Choral Canada's 2019 National Competition for Canadian Amateur Choirs. Exultate was proud to have been selected to perform at PODIUM 2022, Canada's national choral conference and festival.

In addition to presenting its annual concert series, Exultate has made regular appearances around Ontario, toured in Canada, collaborated with dozens of artists, released six albums, and enjoyed airplay on CBC Radio. Exultate is committed to showcasing new Canadian choral music through commissioning and programming.

Dr. Tracy Wong hails from Malaysia and is a conductor, educator, composer, vocalist, and pianist. She is Assistant Professor of Choral Studies at Western University, London, Ontario, and conductor of the Grand Philharmonic Youth Choir, Kitchener, Ontario. Dr. Wong is passionate about helping choral educators to provide unique experiences for their students through collaborative commissions, customized workshops, festivals, and artist residencies. Her choral works are available on Cypress Choral Music, Graphite Publishing, and Young Choral Academy.

Antara (Between)

... is a musical expression of being in between and the celebration of human resilience. The music reflects this through texts by Malay lyricist Mohamad Fairuz bin Mohamad Tauhid, which suggests that strength, in times of conflict, comes from recognizing our growth and embracing discomfort. This is explored through asymmetry (being in limbo), pedal points (stillness), and rhythmic drive (anxious/anticipation/excitement). The loose rondo form allows the theme "antara" to return in between sections of these musical thoughts.

Sami Anguaya is a singer, composer, and recent graduate of the University of Toronto's Master's in Composition program. He had the pleasure of being part of Toronto's East Chamber Music Emerging Composer Festival and was excited to have "Speak to Us of Joy" showcased at PODIUM 2022. Sami's graduate work focused on integrating elements of his Kichwa heritage (Ecuador) into his music and exploring methods of positive cross-cultural collaborations with other Kichwa artists.

... is about celebrating the beauty of life and the importance of acknowledging one's sorrow in order to appreciate moments of joy. The piece is a vibrant rhythmic setting of Kahlil Gibran's poem "On Joy and Sorrow" from *The Prophet*, and is inspired by the driving choral works of Moses Hogan and the exciting South American grooves the composer grew up around. Through passages of exclamation and gentle reflection, it is a reminder that joy and sorrow are deeply connected, as Gibran writes, "Your joy is your sorrow unmasked."

... is a setting of Shakespeare's achingly beautiful sonnet (no. 60) about the journey of life. It is often a perilous journey that unavoidably leads to our own mortality. The piece starts with some gentle imagery of waves lapping which change as we enter the different stages of life, from birth through youth, and into maturity. With such a rich text, there are many opportunities for musical word painting. The poem and piece come to a hopeful conclusion that we will be remembered beyond our time here on Earth.

Matthew studied at the University of British Columbia (B.Mus.) and the University of Toronto (M.Mus., D.M.A.). His over sixty publications are published by G. ... is a work for mixed chorus, and though only a few measures long, it is enough to temporarily transport and uplift us to a place of comfort. I wrote the music during a time when the world was in flux; there were many unknowns, and I looked to my immediate surroundings for comfort and for inspiration. The short, fleeting thought by Rabindranath Tagore perfectly captured the sentiment and feeling I sought. The music is an anthem of stability, a reminder that we are joined by our connection to the Earth and to each other.

Virginia Kilbertus is an award-winning and Emmy-nominated composer for film and television. Her most recent accomplishments include the original scores for Seasons 1 and 2 of the Hulu series *Endlings*, the score for the feature film Astronaut starring Richard Dreyfuss, and the original score for the upcoming series *Psi Cops*. Virginia's music draws on her own eclectic influences, fusing rich, classical orchestrations with electronics, jazz, and extended techniques to create a sound that is uniquely her own.

Sailing to Bygantium

... was written in late 2021, nearly two years into the COVID-19 pandemic, and is based upon the Yeats poem of the same name. The poem speaks of mortality—something everyone was forced to confront, no matter their age—when the fragility of the human race was brought into such a harsh reality. The latter half of the poem speaks of liberating the soul when the physical body begins to wither and conveys a beautiful feeling of exaltation and liberation.
