

Founded in 1981, Exultate Chamber Singers is an adult mixed-voice chamber choir located in the heart of downtown Toronto. The ensemble is enriched not only by the strong musicianship of its members but also by their varied ages, cultural backgrounds, and academic and professional credentials. Together they form a passionate, committed ensemble with a wideranging repertoire.

The choir is a three-time winner of the Healey Willan Grand Prize in the CBC National Radio Competition and was most recently awarded first place in the chamber choir category of Choral Canada's 2019 National Competition for Canadian Amateur Choirs.

In addition to presenting its annual concert series, Exultate has made regular appearances around Ontario, toured in Canada, collaborated with dozens of artists, released five albums, and enjoyed airplay on CBC Radio. Exultate is currently producing its sixth album, showcasing new Canadian choral music commissioned by the choir in recent years.

Mark Ramsay is Assistant Professor and Coordinator of Choral Activities at the Don Wright Faculty of Music at Western University. Prior to his appointment at Western University, Dr. Ramsay was Adjunct Professor at the University of Toronto, Faculty of Music. He frequently appears as a guest conductor, adjudicator, and clinician.



Mark holds a Doctor of Musical Arts in choral conducting from U of T where he was a student of Dr. Hilary Apfelstadt. His doctoral thesis focused on Canadian choral repertoire written specifically for tenor/bass voices. In addition, he holds a Master of Music from U of T and a Bachelor of Music Education from University of Prince Edward Island.

Composer Emily Green was born in Ottawa,
Ontario. She is currently completing a Bachelor
of Music degree at the University of Toronto
specializing in voice and composition, and her
choral music has already been published by
several organizations. She has had works
premiered and commissioned by the Ottawa
Regional Youth Choir, the Capital Chamber Choir,
the Ottawa Children's Choir, and Concreamus
Chamber Choir.

Emily has also worked as a teacher and mentor with many musical organizations including the Perth Academy for Musical Theatre, the Ottawa Children's Choir (which she also sang in as a child), and OrKidstra, an Ottawa-based program which provides free music lessons to children and youth from low-income families. She currently works as a singing teacher at Stagecoach Schools.

Mac Van Duger

Mac VanDuzer grew up in Oakville, active in music (Halton Youth Symphony, High Rendition Jazz) and sports. He entered U of T's Faculty of Music, Performance Double Bass, and was also recruited to play Varsity Football; Music took precedence when scheduling both proved impossible. He played with the National Youth Orchestra for three summers, touring Canada, and Europe.

Mac did his Masters in Orchestral Double Bass at the Manhattan School of Music. He graduated into Covid in spring 2020, and returned to U of T (Artists Diploma) in 2021-2022. He is currently Principal Bass with the Guelph Symphony, and is busy as an ensemble player and for recordings.
